This breakout session will address the rising phenomenon of “mixed martial arts” (MMA), sometimes called “ultimate fighting.” As the sport has grown in popularity throughout Hawaii, a number of serious concerns have emerged regarding adolescent behavior and the sport’s glamorization of violence. Specifically, concerns include youth imitating MMA fighters by engaging in loosely organized fights, posting fight videos on the Internet, and a lack of public responsibility shown by MMA organizations for decreasing such behaviors.

Presenters will speak to the following: define MMA, explain MMA’s national and local history, describe MMA’s pervasiveness in Hawaii, illustrate steps MMA organizations have taken to decrease youth violence, and propose collaborative efforts between MMA organizations and violence prevention organizations. The session will take an analytic approach to understanding MMA and developing constructive reform measures intended to suppress youth violence.
