National Response Rate





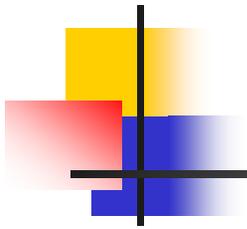
Response Rates by State





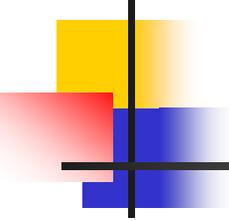

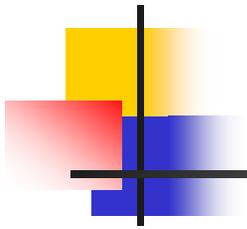
Accuracy and Coverage Evaluation(ACE)

- ACE is an independent quality check of Census 2000.
- It consists of 300,000 households nationwide.
- Results are used to determine the census undercount.

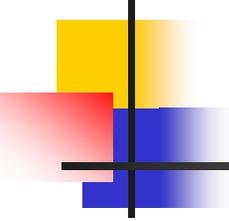

Apportionment


- Article 1, Section 2 of the U.S. Constitution
- The process of dividing the 435 members or seats in the U.S. House of Representatives among the 50 states
- The apportionment calculation is based upon the total resident population (citizens and non-citizens) of the 50 states
- The average population per representative is expected to be over 640,000

Apportionment for the 108th Congress

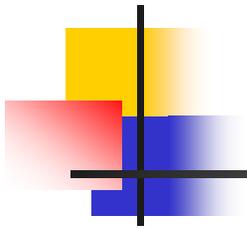


Change from 1990 to 2000

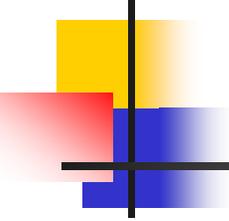
- State gaining 2 seats in the House

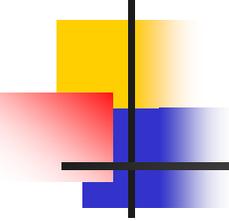

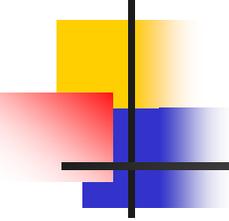

Major Changes

- Spanish/Hispanic/Latino asked before race
- Respondents could select more than 1 race
- American Indian and Alaska Native combined
- Asian & Pacific Islander category split:
 - Asian
 - Native Hawaiian and Other Pacific Islander

Understanding Census Geography

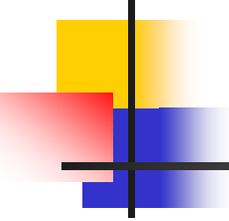
Two Key Questions When Using Data:

- Population data tells us how *many*
- Census Geography tells us *where*



Census Geography: Two Broad Categories

- **Legal and Administrative Entities**
Geographic areas that originate from legal action, treaties, statutes, ordinances, resolutions, or court decisions.
- *Specific examples:*
Nation, States, Counties, Incorporated Places, Consolidated Cities, American Indian Reservations, Hawaiian Home Lands, Congressional Districts, Voting Districts, School Districts, Traffic Analysis Zones, ZIP Codes



Census Geography: Two Broad Categories

- **Statistical Entities**

Areas that evolve from practice, custom, usage, or need

- *Specific examples:*

Regions, Divisions, Metropolitan Statistical Areas (MSAs), Consolidated MSAs, Primary MSAs, Urbanized Areas, Census County Divisions, Census Tracts, Block Groups, Blocks

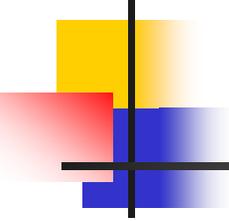

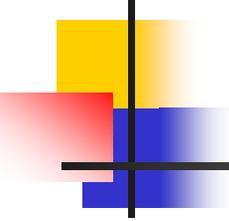

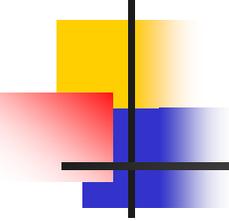

Census Geography

Census Designated Place

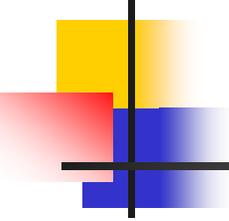
- No legally defined corporate limits (unincorporated)
- Defined by the Census Bureau in co-operation with State, Tribal and local officials
- Identified in data tables by the acronym CDP following the place name
- All places in Hawaii are Census Designated Places



Census Geography

Census Tract

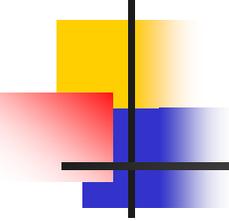
- Small, relatively permanent statistical subdivision of a county
- Average of 1,000 housing units and 4,000 people
- Census tracts are designed to be relatively homogeneous units with respect to population characteristics, economic status, and living conditions



Census Geography

Block Group

- Subdivision of a census tract
- Block group is the smallest geographic unit for the tabulation of *sample data*
- Block group consists of all blocks within a census tract with the same beginning number


Census Block

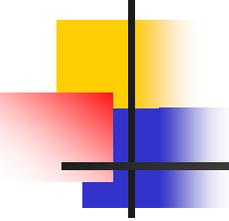
- Smallest geographic unit for which the Census Bureau tabulates *100% data*
- Many blocks correspond to individual city blocks bounded by streets
- However blocks, especially in rural areas, may include many square miles and may have boundaries that are not streets

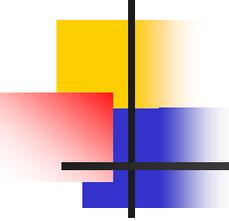

- **Public Law 94-171 enacted in 1975**
- **Outgrowth of 1960's court decisions on "One-Person / One Vote" and 1965 Voting Rights Act**
- **State legislatures can receive data according to local definitions to ease planning of new district boundaries**
- **First look at race/ethnic profile of local community**

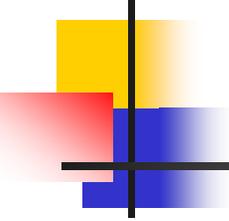


American Community Survey

- A survey developed by the Census Bureau to provide demographic, economic, and housing profiles of America's communities every year.
- The ACS will replace the decennial long form in 2010.
- The ACS is conducted using mailed questionnaires, telephone interviews, and visits from Census field representatives.
- Questions similar to the Census 2000 long form.
- Full implementation in 2003 with 3 million households in sample.



Current Population Survey


- A monthly survey of 65,000 households conducted by the Census Bureau for the Bureau of Labor Statistics.
- Its primary task is to produce monthly statistics on unemployment and the labor force.
- It also serves as a vehicle for supplemental studies on subjects other than employment, such as marital status, birth history, tobacco use.




Current Population Survey Published Reports

- Population Characteristics
 - Geographic residence and mobility
 - School enrollment
 - Marital Status and living arrangements
 - Households and families
 - Asian and Pacific Islander, Black and Hispanic populations
- Issued every other year
- Reports and detailed tables available on the Census Bureau's internet site free of charge




- **Special Studies**
 - **Information on specialized data**
 - **Family Life, Women, Voter Turnout, Computer Use, Profile of the Foreign-Born Population and other topics**
- **Consumer Income and Poverty**
 - **Information concerning families, individuals, and households at various income levels**
 - **Data are also presented on non-cash benefits and the relationship of income to age, sex, race, family size, education, occupation, work experience and other characteristics.**




Survey of Program Participation

- A sample household survey of non-institutional population collecting data from the same household over 32 months.
- Provides estimates of money and in-kind income and participation in government programs.
- SIPP data is published in the Household Economic Statistics Report




Consumer Expenditure Survey

- Tracks consumer spending behavior
- A source of data for the Consumer Price Index (CPI), commonly referred to as the “inflation rate”
- Data published by the Bureau of Labor Statistics




National Crime Victimization Survey

- Obtains detailed information about persons victimized by certain types of crime such as theft, burglary, robbery, assault, rape, purse snatching/pocket picking
- Data published by the Bureau of Justice




National Health Interview Survey

- Major source of health information on people living in the U.S.
- Information collected about health, illness, and the use of health services
- Data published by the National Center for Health Statistics

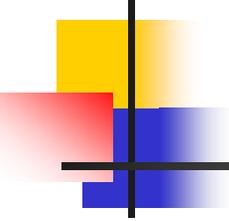


American Housing Survey

- Provides current and continuous series of data on selected housing and demographic characteristics
- Conducted nationally and in selected metropolitan areas
- Data published jointly by the Census Bureau and the Department of Housing and Urban Development



- Data is published on the basis of the North American Industrial Classification System(NAICS).


