COMPLAINT

Plaintiff, for a cause of action against the above-named defendant,
avers and alleges that:

ALLEGATIONS COMMON TO ALL COUNTS

1. This is an action brought by the Office of Consumer Protection of
the State of Hawaii pursuant to Hawaii Rev. Stat. Chapters 446E, 480 and 487

seeking to enjoin the Defendant from engaging in certain acts or practices in violation of Hawaii's consumer protection laws and to obtain other and additional relief.

2. This court has subject matter jurisdiction over this case pursuant to Hawaii Rev. Stat. §§ 480-21 and 603-21.5.

3. Defendant Concordia Ivy College, LLC ("CIC") is a Hawaii corporation.

4. Defendant CIC maintains a website located at <http://www.concordia-ivy-edu.net>.

5. Defendant CIC is not now and never has been accredited by a recognized accrediting agency or association recognized by the United States Secretary of Education.

6. Defendant CIC is an "unaccredited institution" as that phrase is defined in Hawaii Rev. Stat. § 446E-1.

7. Defendant CIC has a "presence" in the State of Hawaii as that term is used in Haw. Rev. Stat. §446E-1.

COUNT I
FAILURE TO PRODUCE RECORDS, DOCUMENTS AND INFORMATION

8. Plaintiff repeats and realleges the allegations contained in paragraphs 1 through 7 as though fully set forth herein.

9. On June 28, 2006, Plaintiff requested CIC to produce certain documents, records and information and to provide testimony.

10. CIC has failed to respond in violation of Hawaii Rev. Stat. §446E-2(c).

11. Violations of Hawaii Rev. Stat. § 446E-2(c) constitute *per se* violations of Hawaii Rev. Stat. § 480-2(a).

COUNT II
FAILURE TO HAVE AN OFFICE LOCATED IN HAWAII

12. Plaintiff repeats and realleges the allegations contained in paragraphs 1 through 11 as though fully set forth herein.

13. Defendant CIC has failed to have an office located in Hawaii in violation of Hawaii Rev. Stat. §446E-5(d).

14. Violations of Hawaii Rev. Stat. § 446E-5(d) constitute *per se* violations of Hawaii Rev. Stat. § 480-2(a).

COUNT III
FAILURE TO HAVE AN EMPLOYEE LOCATED IN HAWAII

15. Plaintiff repeats and realleges the allegations contained in paragraphs 1 through 14 as though fully set forth herein.

16. Defendant CIC has failed to have an employee located in Hawaii in violation of Hawaii Rev. Stat. §446E-5(d).

17. Violations of Hawaii Rev. Stat. § 446E-5(d) constitute *per se* violations of Hawaii Rev. Stat. § 480-2(a).

COUNT IV
FAILURE TO PROPERLY MAKE STATUTORY DISCLOSURES

18. Plaintiff repeats and realleges the allegations contained in paragraphs 1 through 17 as though fully set forth herein.

19. CIC has failed to properly and adequately disclose in its catalogs, promotional material and/or contracts for instruction the fact that it is not accredited

by an accrediting agency recognized by the United States Secretary of Education in violation of Hawaii Rev. Stat. § 446E-2(a).

20. The publication of each and every catalog and promotional material and the execution of each contract for instruction that failed to properly and adequately disclose the fact that CIC is and was not accredited by an accrediting agency recognized by the United States Secretary of Education constitutes a separate and independent violation of Hawaii Rev. Stat. § 446E-2(a).

21. Alternatively, the provision to each student of such a catalog or promotional material or the execution of a contract for instruction that failed to properly and adequately disclose the fact that CIC is and was not accredited by an accrediting agency recognized by the United States Secretary of Education constitutes a separate and independent violation of Hawaii Rev. Stat. § 446E-2(a).

22. Violations of Hawaii Rev. Stat. § 446E-2(a) constitute *per se* violations of Hawaii Rev. Stat. § 480-2(a).

COUNT V
ILLEGAL INDICATIONS OR SUGGESTIONS OF STATE APPROVAL

23. Plaintiff repeats and realleges the allegations contained in paragraphs 1 through 22 as though fully set forth herein.

24. In its website, CIC indicated or suggested that the State of Hawaii approved its operations.

25. Such indications or suggestions violate Hawaii Rev. Stat. §446E-5(a).

26. Violations of Hawaii Rev. Stat. § 446E-5(a) constitute *per se* violations of Hawaii Rev. Stat. § 480-2(a).

COUNT VI
INJUNCTIVE RELIEF

27. Plaintiff repeats and realleges the allegations contained in paragraphs 1 through 26 as though fully set forth herein.

28. Unless Defendant is restrained and enjoined by this court from continuing to violate Hawaii Rev. Stat. Chap. 446E and § 480-2(a) in the manner described herein, it will continue to do so, irreparably harming and injuring the consuming public of the State of Hawaii.

WHEREFORE, plaintiff prays that this court:

1. Find, order, adjudge and declare that Defendant's conduct, as alleged herein, violates the statutory provisions set forth above.

2. Issue a temporary restraining order, preliminary injunction and permanent injunction directing the Business Registration Division of the Department of Commerce and Consumer Affairs of the State of Hawaii to dissolve, terminate, revoke and/or cancel all trade names, trademarks, corporate registrations (including that for USAIU), certificates of authority held by or for the defendant.

3. Issue a temporary restraining order, preliminary injunction and permanent injunction enjoining the defendants, their agents, employees, successors and assigns, directly or indirectly, individually or in concert with the others, or through any corporate or other device from any of the following:

a. Providing any post-secondary instructional programs or

courses leading to a degree;

- b. Acting as or holding themselves out as a “college, academy, institute, institution, university” or anything similar thereto;
- c. Failing to comply with Hawaii Rev. Stat. Chap. 446E or § 480-2(a) in any particulars; and
- d. Owning or operating any business in the State of Hawaii, claiming to operate under the laws of the State of Hawaii, or having a presence in Hawaii until all restitution, civil penalties and costs entered herein are fully satisfied.

4. Assess appropriate civil penalties against the defendant pursuant to Hawaii Rev. Stat. § 480-3.1 and enter judgment in favor of the plaintiff accordingly.

5. Award any consumers injured by the aforementioned violations full restitution, including pre and post judgment interest, against the defendant, pursuant to Hawaii Rev. Stat. § 487-14 and the court's inherent authority and enter judgment accordingly.


6. Assess and award judgment in favor of the plaintiff and against the defendant, for attorneys' fees, costs, cost of the investigation, interests and other expenses.

7. Award the plaintiff such other relief as the court may deem just and equitable under the circumstances.
