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GENERAL INFORMATION ON CONDOMINIUMS

A condominium is a special form of real property. To create a condominium in Hawaii, the requirements of Hawaii's "Horizontal Property Act" (Chapter 514A, Hawaii Revised Statutes) must be followed.

If you are a typical condominium apartment owner, you will have two kinds of ownership: (1) ownership in your individual apartment; and (2) an undivided interest in the common elements.

Common elements are the areas of the condominium project other than the individual apartments. They are owned jointly by all apartment owners and include the land, either in fee simple or leasehold, and those parts of the building or buildings intended for common use such as foundations, columns, roofs, halls, elevators, and the like. Your undivided interest in the common elements cannot be separated from ownership of your apartment.

In some condominium projects, some common elements are reserved for the exclusive use of the owners of certain apartments. These common elements are called limited common elements and may include parking stalls, patios, lanais, trash chutes, and the like.

You will be entitled to exclusive ownership and possession of your apartment. Condominium apartments may be individually bought, sold, rented, mortgaged, or encumbered, and they may be disposed of by will, gift, or operation of law.

Your apartment will, however, be part of the group of apartments that comprise the condominium project. Study the Declaration, Bylaws, and House Rules. These documents contain important information on the use and occupancy of apartments and the common elements as well as the rules of conduct for owners, tenants, and guests.

Some condominium projects are leasehold. This means that the land or the land, building(s) and other improvements are leased to the buyer. The lease for the land usually requires that at the end of the lease term, the lessees (apartment owner/tenant) deliver their interest in the land to the lessor (fee property owner). The lease also usually requires that the lessees either (1) convey to the lessor the building(s) and other improvements, including any improvements paid for by the lessees; or (2) remove or dispose of the improvements. The leases for individual apartments often require that at the end of the lease term, the lessee deliver to the lessor the apartment, including any improvements placed in the apartment by the lessee.

Operation of the Condominium Project

The Association of Apartment Owners is the entity through which apartment owners may take action with regard to the administration, management, and operation of the condominium project. Each apartment owner is automatically a member of the Association.

The Board of Directors is the governing body of the Association. Unless you serve as a board member or an officer, or are on a committee appointed by the board, your participation in the administration and operation of the condominium project will in most cases be limited to your right to vote as an apartment owner. The Board of Directors and officers can take certain actions without a vote of the owners. Some of these actions may significantly impact the quality of life for all apartment owners.

Until there is a sufficient number of purchasers of apartments to elect a majority of the Board of Directors, it is likely that the developer will effectively control the affairs of the Association. It is frequently necessary for the developer to do so during the early stages of development and the developer may reserve certain special rights to do so in the Declaration and Bylaws. Prospective buyers should understand that it is vitally important to all apartment owners that the transition from developer to owner control be accomplished in an orderly manner and in a spirit of cooperation.

Based on a report prepared by an independent registered architect, it is the Developers' opinion that all structural components and mechanical and electrical installations material to the use and enjoyment of the condominium apartment are presently sound and appear to be in satisfying working condition. However, NO REPRESENTATIONS OF ANY KIND ARE MADE AS TO THE EXPECTED USEFUL LIFE, IF ANY, OF THE STRUCTURAL COMPONENTS AND MECHANICAL AND ELECTRICAL INSTALLATIONS MATERIAL TO THE USE AND ENJOYMENT OF THE CONDOMINIUM APARTMENT.

b. Compliance with Building Code and Municipal Regulations; Cost to Cure Violations

The Project is a conversion of fully constructed and existing buildings to condominium status. Said buildings are in compliance with all ordinances, codes, rules, regulations, or other requirements in force at the time of their construction. No variance has been granted from any ordinance, code, rule, regulation, or other requirement in force at the time of their construction or from any other ordinance, code, rule, regulation, or other requirement.

Limitations may include restrictions on extending, enlarging, or continuing the non-conformity, and restrictions on altering and repairing structures. In some cases, a non-conforming structure that is destroyed or damaged cannot be reconstructed.

The buyer may not be able to obtain financing or insurance if the condominium project has a non-conforming or illegal use, structure, or lot.

D. Common Elements, Limited Common Elements, Common Interest:

1. Common Elements: Common Elements are those parts of the condominium project intended to be used by all apartment owners. They are owned jointly by all apartment owners.

2. Limited Common Elements: Limited Common Elements are those common elements which are reserved for the exclusive use of the owners of certain apartments.

The only limited common elements so set aside and reserved are the immediate land area upon and around which each apartment is located. Said land areas are shown and delineated on the Condominium Map.

3. Common Interest: Each apartment will have an undivided fractional interest in all of the common elements. This interest is called the "common interest." It is often used to determine each apartment's share of the maintenance fees and other common profits and expenses of the condominium. It may also be used for other purposes, including voting on matters requiring action by apartment owners.

Each apartment and its owner(s) shall have appurtenant thereto a one-fourth (1/4) fractional interest (25.0 percentage interest) in the common elements of the Project, for all purposes including voting, said interest being referred to as the "common interest".

E. **Encumbrances Against Title:** An encumbrance is a claim against or a liability on the property.

Exhibit B describes the encumbrances against the title contained in the title report dated January 7, 1987 .

Blanket Liens:

A blanket lien is a mortgage on a condominium project that secures a construction loan. It is usually released on an apartment-by-apartment basis upon payment of specified sums so that individual apartments can be conveyed to buyers free and clear of the lien.

Blanket liens (except for improvement district or utility assessments) must be released before the developer conveys the apartment to a buyer. Buyer's interest will be affected only if the developer defaults prior to conveying the apartment to buyer.

F. **Management of the Common Elements:** The Association of Apartment Owners is responsible for the management of the common elements and the overall operation of the condominium project. The Association may be permitted, and in some cases may be required, to employ or retain a managing agent to assist the Association in managing the condominium project.

Initial Managing Agent: When the developer or the developer's affiliate is the initial managing agent, the management contract must have a term of one year or less and the parties must be able to terminate the contract on notice of 60 days or less.

IV. ADDITIONAL INFORMATION NOT COVERED ABOVE

Buyer's Right to Cancel Sales Contract:

A. Rights Under the Condominium Statute:

Preliminary Report: Sales made by the Developer are not binding. A prospective buyer who cancels the sales contract is entitled to a refund of all moneys paid, less any escrow cancellation fee up to \$250.00.

Supplementary Report to a Preliminary Report: Same as for Preliminary Report.

Final Report, Supplementary Report to a Final Report: Sales made by the Developer are binding if:

1. The Developer delivers to the buyer a copy of:
 - a. Either the Final Public Report OR the Supplementary Public Report which has superseded the Final Public Report;
AND
 - b. Any other public report issued by the Commission prior to the date of delivery, if the report was not previously delivered to the buyer and if the report has not been superseded;
2. The buyer is given an opportunity to read the report(s); and
3. One of the following has occurred:
 - a. The buyer has signed a receipt for the report(s) and waived the right to cancel; or
 - b. Thirty (30) days have passed from the time the report(s) were delivered to the buyer; or
 - c. The apartment is conveyed to the buyer within 30 days from the date the report(s) were delivered to the buyer.

Material Change: Binding contracts with the Developer may be rescinded by the buyer if:

1. There is a material change in the condominium which directly, substantially, and adversely affects (a) the use or value of the buyer's apartment or its limited common elements; or (b) the amenities available for buyer's use; and
2. The buyer has not waived the right to rescind.

If the buyer rescinds a binding sales contract because there has been a material change, the buyer is entitled to a full and prompt refund of any moneys the buyer paid.

B. Rights Under the Sales Contract:

Before signing the sales contract, prospective buyers should ask to see and carefully review all documents relating to the condominium. These include but are not limited to the:

1. Condominium Public Reports issued by the Hawaii Real Estate Commission.
2. Declaration of Horizontal Property Regime and Condominium Map.
3. Bylaws of the Association of Apartment Owners.



APARTMENT DESCRIPTIONS

The Escrow Agreement establishes how proceeds from the sale of apartments and all sums received from any source are placed in escrow, as well as the methods of disbursement of said funds. The Escrow Agreement provides that a Purchaser shall be entitled to a refund of his funds, and Escrow shall pay said funds to said Purchaser, without interest and less cancellation fee and costs, if Purchaser shall in writing request refund of his funds and Escrow receives a written request from Developer to return to Purchaser the funds of such Purchaser. Said cancellation fee shall be in the minimum amount of \$25.00, but in no event shall exceed \$125.00, the exact amount to be commensurate with the amount of work completed at the time of cancellation.
