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GENERAL INFORMATION ON CONDOMINIUMS

A condominium is a special form of real property. To create a condominium in Hawaii, the requirements of Hawaii's "Condominium Property Act" (Chapter 514A, Hawaii Revised Statutes) must be followed.

If you are a typical condominium apartment owner, you will have two kinds of ownership: (1) ownership in your individual apartment; and (2) an undivided interest in the common elements.

Common elements are the areas of the condominium project other than the individual apartments. They are owned jointly by all apartment owners and include the land, either in fee simple or leasehold, and those parts of the building or buildings intended for common use such as foundations, columns, roofs, halls, elevators, and the like. Your undivided interest in the common elements cannot be separated from ownership of your apartment.

In some condominium projects, some common elements are reserved for the exclusive use of the owners of certain apartments. These common elements are called limited common elements and may include parking stalls, patios, lanais, trash chutes, and the like.

You will be entitled to exclusive ownership and possession of your apartment. Condominium apartments may be individually bought, sold, rented, mortgaged, or encumbered, and they may be disposed of by will, gift, or operation of law.

Your apartment will, however, be part of the group of apartments that comprise the condominium project. Study the Declaration, Bylaws, and House Rules. These documents contain important information on the use and occupancy of apartments and the common elements as well as the rules of conduct for owners, tenants, and guests.

Some condominium projects are leasehold. This means that the land or the building(s) and other improvements are leased to the buyer. The lease for the land usually requires that at the end of the lease term, the lessee (apartment owner/tenant) deliver their interest in the land to the lessor (fee property owner). The lease also usually requires that the lessees either (1) convey to the lessor the building(s) and other improvements, including any improvements paid for by the lessees; or (2) remove or dispose of the improvements. The leases for individual apartments often require that at the end of the lease term, the lessee deliver to the lessor the apartment, including any improvements placed in the apartment by the lessee.

Operation of the Condominium Project

The Association of Apartment Owners is the entity through which apartment owners may take action with regard to the administration, management, and operation of the condominium project. Each apartment owner is automatically a member of the Association.

The Board of Directors is the governing body of the Association. Unless you serve as a board member or an officer, or are on a committee appointed by the board, your participation in the administration and operation of the condominium project will in most cases be limited to your right to vote as an apartment owner. The Board of Directors and officers can take certain actions without a vote of the owners. Some of these actions may significantly impact the quality of life for all apartment owners.

Until there is a sufficient number of purchasers of apartments to elect a majority of the Board of Directors, it is likely that the developer will effectively control the affairs of the Association. It is frequently necessary for the developer to do so during the early stages of development and the developer may reserve certain special rights to do so in the Declaration and Bylaws. Prospective buyers should understand that it is vitally important to all apartment owners that the transition from developer to owner control be accomplished in an orderly manner and in a spirit of cooperation.

The Condominium Statute (Chapter 514A, HRS), the Declaration, Bylaws, and House Rules control the rights and obligations of the apartment owners with respect to the common elements, to each other, and to their respective apartments. The provisions of these documents are intended to be, and in most cases are, enforceable in a court of law.

D. **House Rules.** The Board of Directors may adopt house rules to govern the use and operation of the common elements and individual apartments. House rules may cover matters such as parking regulations, hours of operation for common facilities such as recreation areas, use of lanais, keeping of pets, and occupancy limits. These rules must be followed by owners, tenants, and guests. They do not need to be recorded or filed to be effective. The initial house rules are usually adopted by the developer.

D. Common Elements, Limited Common Elements, Common Interest:

1. **Common Elements:** Common Elements are those parts of the condominium project intended to be used by all apartment owners. They are owned jointly by all apartment owners.

2. **Limited Common Elements:** Limited Common Elements are those common elements which are reserved for the exclusive use of the owners of certain apartments.

3. **Common Interest:** Each apartment will have an undivided fractional interest in all of the common elements. This interest is called the "common interest." It is often used to determine each apartment's share of the maintenance fees and other common profits and expenses of the condominium. It may also be used for other purposes, including voting on matters requiring action by apartment owners.

E. Encumbrances Against Title: An encumbrance is a claim against or a liability on the property.

Blanket Liens:

A blanket lien is a mortgage on a condominium project that secures a construction loan. It is usually released on an apartment-by-apartment basis upon payment of specified sums so that individual apartments can be conveyed to buyers free and clear of the lien.

Blanket liens (except for improvement district or utility assessments) must be released before the developer conveys the apartment to a buyer. Buyer's interest will be affected only if the developer defaults prior to conveying the apartment to buyer.

F. Management of the Common Elements: The Association of Apartment Owners is responsible for the management of the common elements and the overall operation of the condominium project. The Association may be permitted, and in some cases may be required, to employ or retain a managing agent to assist the Association in managing the condominium project.

Initial Managing Agent: When the developer or the developer's affiliate is the initial managing agent, the management contract must have a term of one year or less and the parties must be able to terminate the contract on notice of 60 days or less.



Buyer's Right to Cancel Sales Contract:

A. Rights Under the Condominium Statute:

Preliminary Report: Sales made by the Developer are not binding. A prospective buyer who cancels the sale contract is entitled to a refund of all moneys paid, less any escrow cancellation fee up to \$250.00.

Supplementary Report to a Preliminary Report: Same as for Preliminary Report.

Final Report, Supplementary Report to a Final Report: Sales made by the Developer are binding if:

1. The Developer delivers to the buyer a copy of:
 - a. Either the Final Public Report **OR** the Supplementary Public Report which has superseded the Final Public Report;
AND
 - b. Any other public report issued by the Commission prior to the date of delivery, if the report was not previously delivered to the buyer and if the report has not been superseded;
2. The buyer is given an opportunity to read the report(s); and
3. One of the following has occurred:
 - a. The buyer has signed a receipt for the report(s) and waived the right to cancel; or
 - b. Thirty (30) days have passed from the time the report(s) were delivered to the buyer; or
 - c. The apartment is conveyed to the buyer within 30 days from the date the report(s) were delivered to the buyer.

Material Change: Binding contracts with the Developer may be rescinded by the buyer if:

1. There is a material change in the condominium which directly, substantially, and adversely affects (a) the use or value of the buyer's apartment or its limited common elements; or (b) the amenities available to the buyer's use; and
2. The buyer has not waived the right to rescind.

If the buyer rescinds a binding sales contract because there has been a material change, the buyer is entitled to a full and prompt refund of any moneys the buyer paid.

B. Rights Under the Sales Contract:

Before signing the sales contract, prospective buyers should ask to see and carefully review all documents relating to the condominium. These include but are not limited to the:

1. Condominium Public Reports issued by the Hawaii Real Estate Commission.
2. Declaration of Condominium Property Regime and Condominium Map.
3. Bylaws of the Association of Apartment Owners.
4. House Rules.
5. Escrow Agreement.
6. Hawaii's Condominium Law (Chapter 514A, HRS, as amended; Hawaii Administrative Rules, Chapter 16-107, adopted by the Real Estate Commission).
7. Other _____

If these documents are not in final form, the buyer should ask to see the most recent draft.



Each unit owner shall have the right at his sole option at any time and from time to time, as hereinafter set forth, without the consent and/or approval of the owner of the other unit or any other persons or entity, to improve, renovate, remodel, make additions to, enlarge, remove, replace, alter or restore the improvements to or in his unit or portions thereof or upon the lot appurtenant to his unit (collectively, the foregoing are referred to as "alterations"). Each unit owner shall have the right without the consent or joinder of any other person to amend this declaration and the Condominium File Plan to accomplish any such alterations. If required by the Act, promptly upon completion of such alterations the owner of the altered unit shall duly record such amendment to this declaration in the Bureau of Conveyances, together with a complete set of the floor plans of such unit as so altered, certified by a registered architect or professional engineer to fully and accurately depict the altered portions of the property as built. All existing unit owners and all future unit owners and their mortgagees, by accepting an interest in a unit, consent to all such alterations and agree to give and shall be deemed to have given the owner of the altered unit a power of attorney to execute an amendment to the declaration solely for the purpose of describing the alterations to such unit in the declaration so that the owner of the altered unit shall hereafter have a power of attorney from all the other unit owners to execute such amendment to the declaration. This power of attorney shall be deemed coupled with each owner's interest in his unit (including his common interest) and shall be irrevocable.

2. Any alteration of the plans of a unit pursuant to this paragraph J shall be subject to the following conditions:

(a) All building plans for any such alterations shall conform with County building or zoning laws and other applicable County ordinances.

(b) Such alterations may decrease or increase the size of the affected unit, provided that no alteration shall extend or place the unit outside of the limits of the lot appurtenant to such unit.

(c) All such alterations shall be at the sole expense of the unit owner making the change and shall be made within one (1) year of the commencement thereof and in a manner that will not unreasonably interfere with the other unit owner's use of his unit or lot.

(d) The owner of the altered unit shall have the right to utilize, relocate and realign existing and/or to develop additional, central and appurtenant installations for services to the unit affected by such alteration for electricity, sewer and other utilities and services and when applicable, to add, delete, relocate, realign, designate and grant easement and rights-of-way over, under and on the common elements as necessary or desirable in connection therewith; provided that the same shall not cause any interruption in the service of such utilities to any other part of the project, nor shall it unreasonably interfere with the other unit owner's use or enjoyment of his unit or lot.

(e) Each and every conveyance, lease and mortgage or other lien made or created on any unit and all common interests and other appurtenances thereto shall be subject to the provisions of this paragraph and any lease of a unit shall reserve to all unit owners the rights set forth in this paragraph.

* SPECIAL NOTATION: When applying for zoning permits with the Planning Department of the County of Kauai, 75% of the owners of the project must sign the permit forms. This requirement is binding on all purchasers as well as future assignees.

The approval of the Condominium Public Report should not be construed to mean that all County Codes and Ordinances have been complied with and all subsequent development and use shall comply with applicable County Codes and Ordinances.

Additionally, the creation of the Condominium Property Regime does not mean that the land has met the subdivision requirements of the County. As such, certain facilities/improvements normally associated with County approved subdivisions may not be necessarily provided for.

A copy of the County of Kauai Planning Department letter, dated March 8, 1991, which described in full the County requirements, is a part of this public report and attached as Exhibit "J".

EXHIBIT "C"

COMMON ELEMENTS

The common elements of the project shall specifically include, but are not limited to, the following:

1. The land described in Exhibit "A" attached to the Declaration in fee simple.

2. The driveway area designated on the Condominium File Plan as "common area (driveway)", by cross-hatch and running along the east-west border of Unit A.

3. All yards, grounds, landscaped areas, retaining walls, parking areas and driveways around and between the units.

4. All central and appurtenant installations for common services, including power, light, water, telephone and sewer.

5. Any and all apparatus and installations of common use and all other parts of the project necessary or convenient to its existence, maintenance and safety, or normally in common use.

EXHIBIT "D"

LIMITED COMMON ELEMENTS

Certain units shall have appurtenant thereto easements for the exclusive use of certain limited common elements as follows:

1. Private Lots. The lot upon which each unit is located, as shown on the Condominium File Plan, is appurtenant to and for the exclusive use of such unit, as follows:

2. Mailboxes. The mailboxes for each unit are located in the common driveway area and are for the exclusive use of the unit served thereby.


Note: * The regular maintenance, repair, and property taxes for each unit and appurtenant limited common elements shall be the sole responsibility of each respective unit owner.

** All utilities will be separately metered or otherwise charged, and the common elements will incur no separate utility charges.

EXHIBIT "H"

SUMMARY OF DEPOSIT RECEIPT AND SALES CONTRACT

The Deposit Receipt and Sales Contract, including the terms and conditions attached thereto as Article IV (hereinafter collectively called the "Sales Contract") contain the price and other terms and conditions under which a purchaser will agree to buy a unit in the Project. Among other things, the Sales Contract states:

(a) The total purchase price, method of payment and additional sums which must be paid in connection with the purchase of a unit.

(b) That the purchaser acknowledges having received and read a public report (either preliminary or final) for the Project prior to signing the Sales Contract.

(c) That the Developer makes no representations concerning rental of a unit, income or profit from a unit, or any other economic benefit to be derived from the purchase of a unit.

(d) That the purchaser's money will be held in escrow, under the terms of the Escrow Agreement.

(e) Requirements relating to the purchaser's financing of the purchase of a unit.

(f) That the unit and the Project will be subject to various other legal documents which the purchaser should examine, and that the Developer may change these documents under certain circumstances.

(g) That the Developer makes no warranties regarding the unit, the Project or anything installed or contained in the unit or the Project.

(h) That the purchaser must close the purchase at a certain date and pay closing costs, in addition to the purchase price.

(i) That the purchaser will not receive interest on deposits made under the Sales Contract.

The Sales Contract contains various other important provisions relating to the purchase of a unit in the Project. It is incumbent upon purchasers and prospective purchasers to read with care the specimen sales Contract on file with the Real Estate Commission.

EXHIBIT "I"

SUMMARY OF ESCROW AGREEMENT

The Escrow Agreement sets up an arrangement under which the deposits a purchaser makes pursuant to a Sales Contract will be held by a neutral party ("Escrow"). Under the Escrow Agreement, these things will or may happen:

- (a) Escrow will let the purchaser know when payments are due.
- (b) Escrow will arrange for the purchaser to sign all necessary documents.
- (c) The purchaser will be entitled to a refund of his or her funds only under certain circumstances as set forth in the Sales Contract.

The Escrow Agreement also establishes the procedures for the retention and disbursement of a purchaser's funds and says what will happen to the funds upon a default under the Sales Contract. The Escrow Agreement contains various other important provisions and establishes certain charges with which a purchaser should be familiar. It is incumbent upon purchasers and prospective purchasers to read with care the executed Escrow Agreement on file with the Real Estate Commission.

(d) Escrow may not disburse any purchaser's funds in the construction of the project until completion of the project and the expiration of the mechanic's and materialmen's lien period. Escrow may disburse prior to completion of the project and expiration of the applicable lien period if the Developers would furnish each purchaser an Owners Title Insurance with an endorsement against any future liens placed on the apartments or project as a result of the development, plus providing the Real Estate Commission a release of the General Contractor's lien rights.

After reviewing the subject document, we have the following comments to offer:

The amount of limited common elements corresponds to the allowable unit density permitted by the CZO. The subject property is zoned Residential District (R-2) and qualifies for one (1) unit, however, a second dwelling unit was approved for this property pursuant to Ordinance No. 551, relating to the construction of additional dwelling units.


When applying for Zoning Permits with the Planning Department, the owners must be made aware that 75% of the owners, or their assignee, are required to sign the permit form(s). Should an assignee be designated, such assignee shall present proof of authorization from the 75% of the owners at the time a permit is applied for. This is a requirement because the Planning Department does not recognize the Condominium Report to be a legal subdivision of land.

There should be a disclosure provision written into this and all ensuing condominium reports stating that approval of the report should not be misconstrued to mean that all County Codes and Ordinances have been complied with. Subsequent development and use shall comply with all applicable County Codes and Ordinances. It should also be made clear that the Horizontal Property Regime (HPR) does not necessarily mean that all County

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requirements pertaining to subdivision of lands have been met. Therefore, such facilities/improvements that are normally associated with County-approved subdivisions such as fire protection devices, County street lighting, electricity, upgraded water facilities, improved access for owner and emerging traffic, drainage facilities, etc., may not necessarily be provided for. Further, such services as County street maintenance and trash collection will not be available for interior road/driveways.
