GENERAL INFORMATION ON CONDOMINIUMS

A condominium is a special form of real property. To create a condominium in Hawaii, the requirements of Hawaii's "Condominium Property Act" (Chapter 514A, Hawaii Revised Statutes) must be followed.

Some condominium projects are leasehold. This means that the land or the building(s) and other improvements are leased to the buyer. The lease for the land usually requires that at the end of the lease term, the lessees (apartment owner/tenant) deliver their interest in the land to the lessor (fee property owner). The lease also usually requires that the lessees either (1) convey to the lessor the building(s) and other improvements, including any improvements paid for by the lessees; or (2) remove or dispose of the improvements. The leases for individual apartments often require that at the end of the lease term, the lessee deliver to the lessor the apartment, including any improvements placed in the apartment by the lessee.

If you are a typical condominium apartment owner, you will have two kinds of ownership: (1) ownership in your individual apartment; and (2) an undivided interest in the common elements.

Common elements are the areas of the condominium project other than the individual apartments. They are owned jointly by all apartment owners and include the land, either in fee simple or leasehold, and those parts of the building or buildings intended for common use such as foundations, columns, roofs, halls, elevators, and the like. Your undivided interest in the common elements cannot be separated from ownership of your apartment.

In some condominium projects, some common elements are reserved for the exclusive use of the owners of certain apartments. These common elements are called limited common elements and may include parking stalls, patios, lanais, trash chutes, and the like.

You will be entitled to exclusive ownership and possession of your apartment. Condominium apartments may be individually bought, sold, rented, mortgaged, or encumbered, and they may be disposed of by will, gift, or operation of law.

Your apartment will, however, be part of the group of apartments that comprise the condominium project. Study the Declaration, Bylaws, and House Rules. These documents contain important information on the use and occupancy of apartments and the common elements as well as the rules of conduct for owners, tenants, and guests.

Operation of the Condominium Project

The Association of Apartment Owners is the entity through which apartment owners may take action with regard to the administration, management, and operation of the condominium project. Each apartment owner is automatically a member of the Association.

The Board of Directors is the governing body of the Association. Unless you serve as a board member or an officer, or are on a committee appointed by the board, your participation in the administration and operation of the condominium project will in most cases be limited to your right to vote as an apartment owner. The Board of Directors and officers can take certain actions without a vote of the owners. Some of these actions may significantly impact the quality of life for all apartment owners.

Until there is a sufficient number of purchasers of apartments to elect a majority of the Board of Directors, it is likely that the developer will effectively control the affairs of the Association. It is frequently necessary for the developer to do so during the early stages of development and the developer may reserve certain special rights to do so in the Declaration and Bylaws. Prospective buyers should understand that it is vitally important to all apartment owners that the transition from developer to owner control be accomplished in an orderly manner and in a spirit of cooperation.

The Condominium Statute (Chapter 514A, HRS), the Declaration, Bylaws, and House Rules control the rights and obligations of the apartment owners with respect to the common elements, to each other, and to their respective apartments. The provisions of these documents are intended to be, and in most cases are, enforceable in a court of law.

- D. **House Rules.** The Board of Directors may adopt house rules to govern the use and operation of the common elements and individual apartments. House rules may cover matters such as parking regulations, hours of operation for common facilities such as recreation areas, use of lanais, keeping of pets, and occupancy limits. These rules must be followed by owners, tenants, and guests. They do not need to be recorded or filed to be effective. The initial house rules are usually adopted by the developer.

The House Rules for this condominium are:

E. **Changes to Condominium Documents**

3. Common Interest: Each apartment will have an undivided fractional interest in all of the common elements. This interest is called the "common interest." It is often used to determine each apartment's share of the maintenance fees and other common profits and expenses of the condominium. It may also be used for other purposes, including voting on matters requiring action by apartment owners.

E. Encumbrances Against Title: An encumbrance is a claim against or a liability on the property.

Blanket Liens:

A blanket lien is a mortgage on a condominium project that secures a construction loan. It is usually released on an apartment-by-apartment basis upon payment of specified sums so that individual apartments can be conveyed to buyers free and clear of the lien.

F. Management of the Common Elements: The Association of Apartment Owners is responsible for the management of the common elements and the overall operation of the condominium project. The Association may be permitted, and in some cases may be required, to employ or retain a managing agent to assist the Association in managing the condominium project.

Initial Managing Agent: When the developer or the developer's affiliate is the initial managing agent, the management contract must have a term of one year or less and the parties must be able to terminate the contract on notice of 60 days or less.

IV. ADDITIONAL INFORMATION NOT COVERED ABOVE

Buyer's Right to Cancel Sales Contract:

A. Rights Under the Condominium Statute:

Preliminary Report: Sales made by the Developer are not binding on the prospective buyer. Sales made by the Developer may be binding on the Developer unless the Developer clearly states in the sales contract that sales are not binding. A prospective buyer who cancels the sales contract is entitled to a refund of all moneys paid, less any escrow cancellation fee up to \$250.00.

Supplementary Report to a Preliminary Report: Same as for Preliminary Report.

Final Report, Supplementary Report to a Final Report: Sales made by the Developer are binding if:

1. The Developer delivers to the buyer a copy of:
 - a. Either the Final Public Report **OR** the Supplementary Public Report which has superseded the Final Public Report;
AND
 - b. Any other public report issued by the Commission prior to the date of delivery, if the report was not previously delivered to the buyer and if the report has not been superseded;
2. The buyer is given an opportunity to read the report(s); and
3. One of the following has occurred:
 - a. The buyer has signed a receipt for the report(s) and waived the right to cancel; or
 - b. Thirty (30) days have passed from the time the report(s) were delivered to the buyer; or
 - c. The apartment is conveyed to the buyer within 30 days from the date the report(s) were delivered to the buyer.

Material Change: Binding contracts with the Developer may be rescinded by the buyer if:

1. There is a material change in the condominium which directly, substantially, and adversely affects (a) the use or value of the buyer's apartment or its limited common elements; or (b) the amenities available for buyer's use; and
2. The buyer has not waived the right to rescind.

If the buyer rescinds a binding sales contract because there has been a material change, the buyer is entitled to a full and prompt refund of any moneys the buyer paid.

B. Rights Under the Sales Contract:

Before signing the sales contract, prospective buyers should ask to see and carefully review all documents relating to the condominium. These include but are not limited to the:

1. Condominium Public Reports issued by the Hawaii Real Estate Commission.
2. Declaration of Condominium Property Regime and Condominium Map.
3. Bylaws of the Association of Apartment Owners.
4. House Rules.
5. Escrow Agreement.
6. Hawaii's Condominium Law (Chapter 514A, HRS, as amended; Hawaii Administrative Rules, Chapter 16-107, adopted by the Real Estate Commission).

If these documents are not in final form, the buyer should ask to see the most recent draft.



INDIVIDUAL UNIT DESCRIPTIONS

The Declaration of Condominium Property Regime and plans submitted by the Developer indicate that 54-026 / 54-028 WAIKULAMA STREET is a fee simple condominium conversion project consisting of a total of two condominium units, each unit comprised of a separate or structures. The units are described as follows:

- (a) "54-026 Waikulama" consists of the following: (1) a separate two-story hollow-tile and wood-frame structure, without basement, containing three bedrooms, three baths, living room, family room, study/den, laundry room, kitchen and dining area -- all containing a net interior living area of approximately 1,740 square feet; (2) an enclosed two-car garage of approximately 420 square feet; and (3) any and all other future improvements which may be constructed on the land area appurtenant to said unit by the owner thereof.

- (b) "54-028 Waikulama" consists of the following: (1) a separate two-story hollow-tile and wood-frame structure, without basement, containing three bedrooms, three baths, living room, family room, study/den, laundry room, kitchen and dining area -- all containing a net interior living area of approximately 1,740 square feet; (2) an enclosed two-car garage of approximately 420 square feet; and (3) any and all other future improvements which may be constructed on the land area appurtenant to said unit by the owner thereof.

COMMON ELEMENTS

One freehold estate is designated of all the remaining portions of the Project, herein referred to as "common elements", including specifically, but not limited to:

- (a) The land in fee simple;
- (b) All ducts, electrical equipment, wiring and other central and appurtenant installations for common services, if any, including power, light, sewage, irrigation and telephone;
- (c) Any and all other elements and facilities rationally in common use or necessary to the existence, upkeep and safety of the Project.

The common elements shall remain undivided, and no right shall exist to partition or divide any part thereof, except as provided in the Condominium Property Act. Any such partition or division shall be subject to the prior consent thereto by the holder(s) of all mortgage(s) of any condominium unit(s) which are filed of record.

COMMON INTEREST
