This is a CONDOMINIUM PROJECT, not a subdivision. There are County restrictions on the number of residential units, or other structures, which may be built on the property. Therefore, unless the purchaser is buying an existing residential dwelling, THERE IS NO ASSURANCE THAT THE PURCHASER WILL BE ABLE TO BUILD A RESIDENTIAL DWELLING UNIT ON THE PROPERTY. THERE IS ALSO NO ASSURANCE THAT THE PURCHASER WILL BE ABLE TO CONVERT AN EXISTING NON-RESIDENTIAL STRUCTURE TO A RESIDENTIAL USE. **PRIOR TO PURCHASE, THE PROSPECTIVE PURCHASER IS ADVISED TO REVIEW THIS CONDOMINIUM PROJECT WITH THE RESPECTIVE HAWAII COUNTY PLANNING OFFICES TO RECEIVE THE MOST RECENT DIRECTIVES CONCERNING DEVELOPMENT, REPLACEMENT, EXPANSION, OR CONSTRUCTION OF ANY TYPE OF STRUCTURE FOR THIS CONDOMINIUM PROJECT IN THE FUTURE.**

1. There is presently one (1) agricultural greenhouse on the property, which may be defined as an "apartment" or "unit" under the Condominium Property Act.
2. This public report does not constitute an approval of the project by the Real Estate Commission or any other governmental agency, nor does it warrant that all applicable County codes, ordinance and subdivision requirements have necessarily been complied with.
3. The land area beneath and immediately appurtenant to each unit is designated a LIMITED COMMON ELEMENT and is not a legally subdivided lot. The dotted lines on the Condominium Map bounding the designated number of square feet in each limited common element land are for illustrative purposes only and should not be construed to be the property lines of legally subdivided lots.
4. Facilities and improvements normally associated with County-approved subdivisions, such as fire protection devices, County street lighting, electricity, upgraded water facilities, improved access for owners and emergency traffic, drainage facilities, etc., may not be provided, and services such as County street maintenance and trash collection may not be available for interior roads and driveways.
5. This is to inform you that Chapter 205, Hawaii revised Statutes, does not authorize residential dwellings as a permissible use in an agricultural use district, unless the dwelling is related to an agricultural activity or is a "farm dwelling".

Farm dwelling is defined in Section 205-4.5(a)(4) as "a single family dwelling located on and used in conjunction with a farm, including clusters of single-family farm dwellings permitted within agricultural parks developed by the State, or where agricultural activity provides income to the family occupying the dwelling".

Penalty for violation of Section 205-4.5, Hawaii revised Statutes, is a fine of not more than \$5,000. If any person who is cited for a violation of the law fails to remove the violation within six months of such citation and the violation continues, such person is subject to a citation for a new and separate violation. There shall be a fine of not more than \$5,000 for any additional violation.

6. The land may be subject to rollback real property taxes. The failure of a unit owner to observe restrictions on the use of the land may cancel the County dedication and special real property tax assessment. Please refer to the Director of Planning, County of Hawaii for further information.

THE PROSPECTIVE PURCHASER IS CAUTIONED TO CAREFULLY REVIEW THE CONDOMINIUM DOCUMENTS REFERENCED IN HIS PUBLIC REPORT FOR FURTHER INFORMATION WITH REGARD TO THE FOREGOING.

General Information On Condominiums

A condominium is a special form of real property. To create a condominium in Hawaii, the requirements of the Condominium Property Act, Chapter 514A, Hawaii Revised Statutes, must be complied with. In addition, certain requirements and approvals of the County in which the project is located must be satisfied and obtained.

Some condominium projects are leasehold. This means that the land or the building(s) and other improvements are leased to the buyer. The lease for the land usually requires that at the end of the lease term, the lessees (apartment owners/tenants) deliver their interest in the land to the lessor (fee property owner). The lease also usually requires that the lessees either (1) convey to the lessor the building(s) and other improvements, including any improvements paid for by the lessees; or (2) remove or dispose of the improvements at the lessee's expense. Leases for individual apartments often require that at the end of the lease term, the lessee deliver to the lessor the apartment, including any improvements placed in the apartment by the lessee.

If you are a typical condominium apartment owner, you will have two kinds of ownership: (1) ownership in your individual apartment; and (2) an undivided interest in the common elements.

"Common elements" are the areas of the condominium project other than the individual apartments. They are owned jointly by all apartment owners and include the land, either in fee simple or leasehold, and those parts of the building or buildings intended for common use such as foundations, columns, roofs, halls, elevators, and the like. Your undivided interest in the common elements cannot be separated from ownership of your apartment.

In some condominium projects, some common elements are reserved for the exclusive use of the owners of certain apartments. These common elements are called "limited common elements" and may include parking stalls, patios, lanais, trash chutes, and the like.

You will be entitled to exclusive ownership and possession of your apartment. Condominium apartments may be individually bought, sold, rented, mortgaged or encumbered, and may be disposed of by will, gift, or operation of law.

Your apartment will, however, be part of the group of apartments that comprise the condominium project. Study the project's Declaration, Bylaws, and House Rules. These documents contain important information on the use and occupancy of apartments and the common elements as well as the rules of conduct for owners, tenants, and guests.

Operation of the Condominium Project

The Association of Apartment Owners is the entity through which apartment owners may take action with regard to the administration, management, and operation of the condominium project. Each apartment owner is automatically a member of the Association.

The Board of Directors is the governing body of the Association. Unless you serve as a board member or an officer, or are on a committee appointed by the board, your participation in the administration and operation of the condominium project will in most cases be limited to your right to vote as an apartment owner. The Board of Directors and officers can take certain actions without the vote of the owners. For example, the board may hire and fire employees, increase or decrease maintenance fees, borrow money for repair and improvements and set a budget. Some of these actions may significantly impact the apartment owners.

Until there is a sufficient number of purchasers of apartments to elect a majority of the Board of Directors, it is likely that the developer will effectively control the affairs of the Association. It is frequently necessary for the developer to do so during the early stages of development and the developer may reserve certain special rights to do so in the Declaration and Bylaws. Prospective buyers should understand that it is important to all apartment owners that the transition of control from the developer to the apartment owners be accomplished in an orderly manner and in a spirit of cooperation.

II. CREATION OF THE CONDOMINIUM; CONDOMINIUM DOCUMENTS

House Rules may cover matters such as parking regulations, hours of operation for common facilities such as recreation areas, use of lanais and requirements for keeping pets. These rules must be followed by owners, tenants, and guests. They do not need to be recorded or filed to be effective. The initial House Rules are usually adopted by the developer.

IMPORTANT INFORMATION ON LEASEHOLD CONDOMINIUM PROJECTS

The information contained in this report is a summary of the terms of the lease. For more detailed information, you should secure a copy of the lease documents and read them thoroughly.

If you have any legal questions about leasehold property, the lease documents or the terms of the lease and the consequences of becoming a lessee, you should seek the advice of an attorney.

There are currently no statutory provisions for the mandatory conversion of leasehold condominiums and there are no assurances that such measures will be enacted in the future.

In leasehold condominium projects, the buyer of an apartment will acquire the right to occupy and use the apartment for the time stated in the lease agreement. The buyer will not acquire outright or absolute fee simple ownership of the land. The land is owned by the lessor or the leased fee owner. The apartment owner or lessee must make lease rent payments and comply with the terms of the lease or be subject to the lessor's enforcement actions. The lease rent payments are usually fixed at specific amounts for fixed periods of time, and are then subject to renegotiation. Renegotiation may be based on a formula, by arbitration set in the lease agreement, by law or by agreement between the lessor and lessee. The renegotiated lease rents may increase significantly. At the end of the lease, the apartment owners may have to surrender the apartments, the improvements and the land back to the lessor without any compensation (surrender clause).

When leasehold property is sold, title is normally conveyed by means of an assignment of lease, the purpose of which is similar to that of a deed. The legal and practical effect is different because the assignment conveys only the rights and obligations created by the lease, not the property itself.

The developer of this condominium project may have entered into a master ground lease with the fee simple owner of the land in order to develop the project. The developer may have then entered into a sublease or a new lease of the land with the lessee (apartment owner). The developer may lease the improvements to the apartment owner by way of an apartment lease or sublease, or sell the improvements to the apartment owners by way of a condominium conveyance or apartment deed.

- 2) Thirty (30) days have passed from the time the report(s) were delivered to the buyer; or
- 3) The apartment is conveyed to the buyer within 30 days from the date the report(s) were delivered to the buyer.

Material Change: Binding contracts with the Developer may be rescinded by the buyer if:

A) There is a material change in the project which directly, substantially, and adversely affects (1) the use or value of the buyer's apartment or its limited common elements; or (2) the amenities available for buyer's use; AND

B) The buyer has not waived the right to rescind.

If the buyer rescinds a binding sales contract because there has been a material change, the buyer is entitled to a full and prompt refund of any moneys the buyer paid.

The underlying property is classified and zoned "Agricultural". County ordinance and the Hawaii Land Use laws allows only the construction of farm dwellings on such lands. This is to inform you that Chapter 205, Hawaii Revised Statutes, does not authorize residential dwellings as a permissible use in an agricultural use district, unless the dwelling is related to an agricultural activity or is a "farm dwelling".

Farm Dwelling is defined in Chapter 205.4.5(a)(4) as "a single family dwelling located on and used in connection with a farm, including clusters of single-family farm dwellings permitted within agricultural parks developed by the State, or where agricultural activity provides income to the family occupying the dwelling."

Penalty for violation of Section 205.4.5, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is a fine of not more than \$5,000. If any person who is cited for a violation of the law fails to remove the violation within six months of such citation and the violation continues, such person is subject to a citation for a new and separate violation. There shall be a fine of not more than \$5,000 for any additional violation.

EXHIBIT A

Description of the Estates Created

Two freehold estates were created and designated, and hereinafter referred to as "condominium units" (also referred to herein as "unit" or "units"). Specifically, the two estates so created and designated are referred to hereinafter as "Unit 1" and "Unit 2". Unless provided otherwise herein, each individual condominium unit is comprised of all of the structures and/or other improvements physically located or to be located on the land area appurtenant to said unit, as designated and defined in subparagraphs 5(a) and 5(b) herein. Said condominium units are or will be located as shown and designated on the Condominium Map, the number of which is noted above. The units are described as follows:

(a) "Unit 1" consists of (i) three (3) room, two story, single wall dwelling having a net living area of approximately 551 square feet, and a deck with a net area of approximately 269 square feet, and (ii) any and all other future improvements which may be constructed on the land area appurtenant to said unit by the owner thereof. Specifically, in addition to the above-described improvements, the owner thereof is permitted, if allowed by law, to build any permitted structures on the land area appurtenant to said unit, provided that said structures comply with all applicable building codes and zoning ordinances and provided further that only one single family dwelling may be constructed upon the land area appurtenant to said unit. The costs and expenses of any such future construction shall be borne solely by the owner of said unit.

(b) "Unit 2" consists of (i) one (1) room, single story, wood frame and shade cloth greenhouse with a dirt floor, having a net area of approximately 48 square feet, with no basement, and (ii) any and all other future improvements which may be constructed on the land area appurtenant to said unit by the owner thereof. Specifically, in addition to the above-described improvements, the owner thereof is permitted, if allowed by law, to build any permitted structures on the land area appurtenant to said unit, provided that said structures comply with all applicable building codes and zoning ordinances and provided further that only one single family dwelling may be constructed upon the land area appurtenant to said unit. The costs and expenses of any such future construction shall be borne solely by the owner of said unit.

Description of Common Elements

One freehold estate was designated in all portions of the Project other than the units (except as herein specifically included), these portions of the Project being herein referred to as the "common elements", including specifically, but not limited to:

When applicable, each unit shall also have appurtenant thereto easements in the other unit(s) for the purposes of utility service for, and the maintenance and repair of said utility services, including but not limited to electricity, gas, water, sewage, telephone and television cable;
- (e) The limited common elements described in Exhibit C of this public report and Section 5 of the Declaration.

The common elements shall remain undivided, and no right shall exist to partition or divide any part thereof, except as provided in the Act. Any such partition or division shall be subject to the prior consent thereto by the holder(s) of all mortgage(s) of record against any condominium unit(s).

(d) All other common elements of the Project which are rationally related to less than all of said units shall be limited to the use of such units to which their use is rationally related;

All costs of every kind pertaining to the aforesaid limited common elements, including, but not limited to, costs of landscaping, maintenance, repair, replacement and improvement, shall be borne solely by the owner of the unit to which said limited common elements are appurtenant.

SUMMARY OF SALES CONTRACT

It is Seller's intention to use the most recent edition of the Hawaii Association of Realtor's form of Deposit Receipt Offer and Acceptance (DROA). Among other provisions, the contract will contain the following:

1. Evidence of title: Seller shall furnish Buyer evidence of Seller's marketable title to the interest which is to be conveyed to Buyer. If Seller fails to deliver title as herein provided Buyer has the option to terminate this agreement and have any of Buyer's deposits returned to Buyer. The foregoing shall not exclude any other remedies available to Buyer. Buyer will receive an Owner's standard coverage policy of title insurance at closing: (a) Seller shall pay 60% of the premium to be charged for an Owner's standard coverage policy of title insurance to be issued to the buyer in the amount of the sales price, and (b) Buyer shall pay 40% of such premium and any additional costs relating to the issuance of any extended coverage policy, including a Lender's policy.
2. Default: It is expressly understood and agreed: First: In the event Buyer fails to pay the balance of the purchase price or complete the purchase as herein provided, Seller may (a) bring an action for damages for breach of contract; (b) retain the initial deposit and all additional deposits provided for herein, as liquidated damages, and (c) Buyer shall be responsible for any costs incurred in accordance with this contract. Second: In the event Seller fails to perform his obligations as herein provided, Buyer not being in default, Buyer may (a) bring an action against Seller for damages for breach of contract; (b) file and maintain an action against Seller for specific performance of the contract and (c) Seller shall be responsible for any cost incurred in accordance with this contract. The foregoing shall not exclude any other remedies available to either Seller or Buyer in the event of default and/or a lawsuit arising out of this contract (including a suit by a REALTOR for commission), the prevailing party shall be entitled to recover all costs incurred including reasonable attorney's fees. All expenses incurred by escrow shall be deducted from deposited funds prior to any disbursement to the prevailing party.
3. Closing: For the purpose of this contract "closing" shall be the date upon which all appropriate documents are recorded. Buyer and Seller agree to execute appropriate or customary documents when requested to do so.
4. Time is of the Essence: If either Buyer or Seller for reasons beyond his control cannot perform his obligation to purchase or sell the property by the closing date, then such party by giving escrow written notice prior to the closing date called for in this contract with copies to all parties to this contract, can extend closing for no longer than 30 calendar days to allow performance. Thereafter time is of the essence and the default provisions of Standard Term H apply. Any further extension must then be agreed to in writing by both parties. There is no automatic right to extend. This provision relates only to the extension of the closing date.

SUMMARY OF CONDOMINIUM ESCROW AGREEMENT

1. Sales Contracts Deposited in Escrow. As and when Developer shall enter into a sales contract for the sale of a unit, Developer shall deliver an executed copy of such sales contract to Escrow.

2. Receipt of Funds by Escrow. Developer shall pay over to Escrow any monies received by Developer from purchaser under sales contracts covering units in the Project, including all disbursements made on loan commitments, if any, from lending institutions to individual purchasers.

3. Conditions to be Met Prior to Disbursement. No disbursements of funds held in escrow shall be made unless and until the following conditions have been fulfilled:

(a) The Real Estate Commission shall have issued a Final Report on the Project; provided, however, to the extent any sales contracts are entered into and a purchaser's funds are obtained prior to the issuance of a Final Public Report of the Real Estate Commission, no disbursements shall be made from such purchaser's funds until (i) such Final Public Report shall have been issued; and (ii) the purchaser shall have been given a copy of said Final Report and shall have acknowledged receipt of same or shall have been deemed to have acknowledged receipt of same and Developer's attorney shall have delivered a written opinion to Escrow that the purchaser's sales contract has become effective; and

(b) Developer or Developer's attorney shall have delivered a written opinion to Escrow stating that the requirements of Sections 514A-62 and 514A-63, Hawaii Revised Statutes, as amended, have been met; and, if the project is a conversion project, that requirements of Section 521-38, Hawaii Revised Statutes, as amended, have been complied with; and

(c) Developer shall have given Escrow a written waiver of any option reserved in any sales contract to cancel such sales contract; and

(d) Developer shall have delivered to Escrow a certificate from Developer's architect stating that the project is in compliance with the Federal Fair Housing Amendments Act of 1988.

4. Return of Funds and Documents. A purchaser shall be entitled to a return of funds and Escrow shall pay such funds to such purchaser, without interest, if any one of the following has occurred:

(a) Developer and the purchaser shall have requested Escrow in writing to return to the purchaser the funds of the purchaser held hereunder by Escrow; or

(b) Developer shall have notified Escrow of Developer's exercise of the option to cancel or rescind the sales contract pursuant to any right of cancellation or rescission provided therein or otherwise available to Developer; or

(c) With respect to a purchaser whose funds were obtained prior to the issuance of the Final Report, the purchaser has exercised such purchaser's right to cancel the contract pursuant to Section 514A-62, Hawaii Revised Statutes, as amended; or

(d) The purchaser has exercised the purchaser's right to rescind the contract pursuant to Section 514A-63, Hawaii Revised Statutes, as amended.

In any of the foregoing events, Escrow shall, upon the occurrence of the event described in (a) or (b) above or upon receipt of a written request for a refund from the purchaser upon the occurrence of an event described in (c) or (d) above, unless the purchaser has waived or has been deemed to have waived the right to a refund, pay said funds to said purchaser (less a cancellation fee of Escrow of not less than \$25.00 per unit or a cancellation fee commensurate with the work done by Escrow prior to such cancellation, whichever fee is greater, up to a maximum of \$250.00) and thereupon said sales contract and any conveyance document theretofore delivered to Escrow shall be returned to Developer and shall be deemed no longer held hereunder; provided, however, that no refund shall be made to a purchaser at the purchaser's request prior to receipt by Developer of written notice from Escrow of its intent to make such refund.

(e) Notwithstanding any other provision in this Agreement to the contrary, Escrow further agrees to make refunds to purchasers, in accordance with Part VI, Chapter 514A, Hawaii Revised Statutes, out of the funds then on deposit with Escrow, if Developer and the purchaser shall so request in writing and any one of the following events has occurred:

- (i) No sales contract has been offered to the purchaser who has been placed on Developer's reservation list of owner-occupant applicants; or
- (ii) The purchaser has been unable to obtain adequate financing, or a commitment for adequate financing, for the purchaser's reserved unit within thirty (30) calendar days following the end of the ten (10) calendar day period during which Developer is limited to selling to owner-occupants; or
- (iii) The purchaser desires to cancel the contract on account of hardship circumstances such as those set forth in Section 514A-104(1), Hawaii Revised Statutes; or
- (iv) The purchaser indicates an intent not to become an owner-occupant of such unit.

Except for cancellations under subparagraph (i) above, Escrow may deduct from any such refund made to a purchaser a cancellation fee as set forth above.

5. Purchaser's Default. If the purchaser fails to make any payment to Escrow which is required pursuant to the sales contract on or before the due date thereof or if the purchaser fails to perform in any matter that is being handled by Escrow, Escrow shall promptly notify Developer of any such failure on the part of the purchaser. If Developer subsequently certifies in writing to Escrow that Owner has terminated the sales contract in accordance with the terms thereof and provides to Escrow copies of such notices of termination sent to the purchaser, Escrow shall thereafter treat all funds of the purchaser paid on account of such purchaser's sales contract as funds of Developer and not as funds of the purchaser. Upon written request by Developer, Escrow shall pay such sums to Developer, less any escrow cancellation fee, shall return to Developer any documents that had been theretofore delivered to Escrow by Developer and shall hold all other documents theretofore delivered to Escrow in connection with the purchase of the unit for the statutory period; and, Escrow shall thereupon be released from any further duties or liability hereunder with respect to such funds and such purchaser.

DECLARATION OF COVENANTS, CONDITIONS, AND RESTRICTIONS

WITNESSETH:

Whereas, Declarants have performed certain grading involving both cutting and filling work on said parcel, which grading work was begun without a "grading permit" from the Department of Public Works, County of Hawaii; and

Whereas, Declarants have sought relief from the strict application of certain sections of Chapter 10 (Erosion and Sedimentation Control), Hawaii County Code, from the Hawaii

County Board of Appeals; and

Whereas, Declarants have obtained the services of a soil engineer to ascertain the cut/fill boundary line on said parcel; and,

Whereas, a hearing was held by the Board of Appeals on March 18, 1988; and

Whereas, the Board of Appeals approved Declarants' petition for a variance, subject to certain conditions, which included, inter alia, that Declarants enter into and record certain covenants to run with the land with respect to said parcel, to be enforceable at law or equity by the County of Hawaii; and

Whereas, the County of Hawaii maintains the Waipio Valley Road, which is downslope of said parcel and could conceivably be affected by erosion from said parcel; and

Whereas, Declarants have engaged a soil engineer who has prepared a drainage plan for said parcel which is attached as Exhibit "A;" and

Whereas, Declarants acknowledge that an extensive cut was graded at or near the southeast boundary of said parcel, at or near the boundary with property of Hamakua Sugar Co., Ltd., and that Hamakua Sugar Co., Ltd. did not give prior consent to said cut (except for temporary ingress at the location marked as "Temporary Ingress" on the map attached hereto as Ex. "C") and is in no way responsible for the present condition of said cut;

NOW, THEREFORE, Declarants make the following Declaration of Covenants, Conditions, and Restrictions:

1. Declarants (or Declarants' successors and assigns,

should Declarant convey said parcel) shall construct and maintain in perpetuity to the satisfaction of the Department of Public Works, County of Hawaii, a "drainage system" on said parcel as described in Ex. "A" attached hereto, said construction to be completed within six months of the date of this declaration. The portion of the parcel between the base of the cut and the top of the fill area shall be graded in a uniform manner as shown in Ex. "A."

2. No structure of any kind requiring a building permit from the County of Hawaii shall be constructed on said parcel, unless it is placed entirely within the area described as "Net Buildable Area" in the survey attached hereto as Exhibit "B," and shown on the map attached hereto as Exhibit "C," unless otherwise expressly approved in writing by the Department of Public Works, County of Hawaii. No structure requiring a building permit from the County of Hawaii may be placed on the fill slope unless expressly approved in writing by the Department of Public Works, County of Hawaii.

3. There shall be no further machine grading of the cut along the south-east boundary of said parcel, unless expressly allowed in writing by the Department of Public Works, County of Hawaii, except for removal of material from the base of the cut which may erode from the cut.


It is expressly agreed and understood by declarants that the conditions, covenants, and restrictions herein imposed are reasonable and rationally relate to the objective of preserving the public health, safety, and general welfare, and that those



Omer's plan for diverting surface run-off water from front fill area to rear solid-cut area and on to ditch and stream (Hamakua Sugar ditch run-off) beyond








TYPICAL SWALE DETAIL





This is in response to your letter dated, August 6, 2002, in which you requested the issuance of a written statement, pursuant to the requirements of Hawaii Revised Statutes §514A-40(b)(1), regarding the referenced condominium project. Our research has resulted in the following:

1. The subject 39,720-square foot property is zoned Agricultural (A-40a) by the County and is situated within the State Land Use Agricultural district. Page 9 of the Condominium Public Report incorrectly identifies the county zoning as being A-5a;
2. Planning Department records include the following:
 - a. Our records indicate that Variance Application (A88-1) was approved by the Board of Appeals on March 18, 1988 to provide a variance from certain sections of Chapter 10 (Erosion and Sedimentation Control), Hawaii County Code, relative to certain grading work conducted on the property. The approval is subject to the conditions noted in the Department of Public Works' March 11, 1988 letter to the Board, as well as the conditions outlined in the petitioner's draft Declaration of Covenants, Conditions, and Restrictions. The Board also added another condition, which restricts the construction of any structures within the fill area.

- b. No non-conforming uses or structures are identified on the subject property;
 - c. An Additional Farm Dwelling Agreement (AFDA) was approved on June 28, 2000 to allow for the construction of a second dwelling unit on the subject property; and
 - d. The AFDA applicant, Larry Harrison, has not submitted a copy of the recorded AFDA to the Hawaii County Planning Department as required by the approved AFDA.
 3. Building Division-Department of Public Works (BD-DPW) records indicate the following development of the subject property:
 - a. BP #950319 was issued on March 3, 1995 to build an efficiency dwelling with 364-sq. ft. of living area and a 237-sq. ft. lanai all situated on the second level. The first level of the structure was permitted as all open with no use. This permit remains open. Real Property Tax Office records show this structure to contain 551 square feet of living area and a 269-sq. ft. deck;
 - b. BP #951032 was issued on July 3, 1995 to construct a new farm dwelling consisting of 1,240 square feet of major floor area and 324 square feet of accessory floor area. Planning Department staff consultation with Department of Public Works - Building Division staff on April 19, 2000 is noted in our records stating that this BP was actually for additions to the dwelling being constructed under BP #950319. This permit remains open; and
 - c. BP #001570 was issued on November 27, 2000 to build a 48-sq. ft. greenhouse. This permit was closed due to final inspection recorded on December 28, 2000.
4. Pursuant to §23A-20(a)(1), Ordinance 02-111, the subject CPR project is in compliance with the Hawaii County Subdivision Code as evidenced by Document No. 2000-133341 recorded on September 22, 2000;
5. Chapter 205, HRS does not authorize residential dwellings as a permissible use in the Agricultural District as classified by the State Land Use Commission, unless the dwelling is related to an agricultural activity or is a "farm dwelling." A "farm dwelling" is defined in Section 205-4.5(a)(4) as "a single family dwelling located on and used in conjunction with a farm, including clusters of single-family farm

dwellings permitted within agricultural parks developed by the State, or where agricultural activity provides income to the family occupying the dwelling." All property buyers must comply with Chapter 205, HRS.

6. The Hawaii County Code, Chapter 25, Zoning, Sections 25-5-77(b), (c) and (1) state the following:
 - (a) One (1) single-family dwelling or one (1) farm dwelling shall be permitted on any building site in the "A" district. A farm dwelling is a single-family dwelling that is located on or used in connection with a farm or if the agricultural activity provides income to the family occupying the dwelling.
 - (b) Additional farm dwellings may be permitted in the "A" district only upon the following conditions:
 - (1) A farm dwelling agreement for each additional farm dwelling, on a form prepared by the director, shall be executed between the owner of the building site, any lessee having a lease on the building site with a term exceeding one (1) year from the date of the farm dwelling agreement, and the County. The agreement shall require the dwelling to be used for farm-related purposes.

It should be clearly understood that the mere submittal of an application for an additional farm dwelling agreement does not guarantee approval.


7. For your information, §25-2-7 of the Zoning Code addresses the utilization of permits and approvals. It stipulates that whenever any permit or approval issued under the Zoning Code, not otherwise conditioned, has not been utilized within a period of two years from the date of the written permit or approval, the Planning Director shall initiate proceedings to invalidate the permit or approval. According to our records the applicant has not obtained a building permit within the required two years, which ended on June 28, 2002.

All property buyers must comply with Chapter 25 of the Hawaii County Code.
