1. Call to Order

Presiding Officer Jonathan Johnson called the meeting to order at 10:02 a.m.

2. Approval of Minutes (August 23, 2006)

Mr. Johnson asked if there were any changes to the minutes of the meeting held on August 23, 2006, which was previously distributed to the commission members for review. Hearing none, he asked for a motion to approve the minutes.

Ms. Pregill moved to approve the minutes. Mr. Hunt seconded the motion, which was unanimously approved by all members present by a voice vote.

3. Public Comment

No public comment was made.

4. Discussion and/or Action on the Draft Designs from the United States Mint

Mr. Johnson explained that the final narratives formulated at the last meeting were sent to the United States Mint and that their artists created draft designs from those narratives. He stated that the goal for the meeting was to review the designs, recommend changes and then vote on one design per narrative, which would be sent back to the mint for revision.

The following are the recommended changes/revisions for the selected design candidates for each narrative (selected design candidates are attached):

As a general note, the commission members felt that the Hawaiian island chain needed to be depicted as geographically accurate as possible (scale of each island and their positions in the chain in relation to each other). In addition, the island chain should be shown in relief to display its topography.

Surfing – Hawaii's Gift to the World

Selected Design: HI-1-01

- 1) Surfboard should be turned more vertically on its side (towards the viewer), exposing more of its shape and surface area, so it is "cutting" into the wave. Accordingly, the surfer's legs should be turned towards the viewer as well, with knees bent a little. This would depict the board and the surfer's action on the wave more accurately.
- 2) There should be more contrast/relief between Diamond Head and the surfer (Diamond Head should be darker).
- 3) The surfer's body needs more muscle definition and development.
- 4) Surfer needs to be brought down lower on the coin so that his head is not so close to "HAWAII 1959" at the top. Hopefully this could be accomplished by revision #1 (bending of the knees).

- 5) Ensure that the relief of the graphical elements is equal with the relief of the text elements ("ALOHA" should not appear bolded).

Aloha Spirit

Selected Design: HI-2-02

- 1) Flip the position of the hula dancer (right arm vertical, left arm horizontal), so that she is dancing in towards the island chain (image should be mirrored along the vertical axis).
- 2) Top of Ti leaf skirt should not flair out—should be flushed with abdomen area.
- 3) Including the general revisions listed above, we request 2 draft versions for our consideration:
 - a. Rescale island chain so that the island of Kauai is not "floating" above the hula dancer's head.
 - b. Rescale the hula dancer so that the island of Kauai is not "floating" above the hula dancer's head.

Diamond Head

Selected Design: HI-3-01

- 1) Reduce size of King Kamehameha so that he is not so close to "HAWAII 1959" at the top.

Hawaii, the Island State

Selected Design: HI-4-01

- 1) Reduce size of King Kamehameha so that he is not so close to "HAWAII 1959" at the top.
- 2) The State Motto and/or ribbon should not overlap King Kamehameha's cape or body in any way.
- 3) Including the general revisions listed above, we request 4 draft versions for our consideration:
 - a. Delete flower lei borders, enlarge island chain.
 - b. Same as version 'a' above and remove ribbon that the State Motto is on (State Motto should be printed in relief directly on the coin).
 - c. Reduce thickness of flower lei border—possibly utilizing smaller flowers, or only a single strand of flowers. Also, flower lei border on the left should end above the State Motto.
 - d. Same as version 'c' above and remove ribbon that the State Motto is on (State Motto should be printed in relief directly on the coin).

Hawaii – Diverse But Unified
Selected Design: HI-5-01

- 1) Remove mound under King Kamehameha's feet and replace with a simple line or pedestal to ground him.
- 2) Depiction of King Kamehameha should have more definition/detail.
- 3) State Motto should be in uppercase lettering, larger (maybe in 3 lines, rather than 2), and spelled correctly (UA MAU KE EA O KA 'ĀINA I KA PONO).
- 4) Island chain should be geographically correct (Kauai and Niihau looks farther from the rest of the islands than they actually are).

5. Next Meeting

Ms. Wienert commended the group on a job well done and stated that the recommendations would be sent to the United States Mint by December 8, 2006. She announced that the next meeting would probably be sometime in late January.


6. Announcements


