PESTICIDES & HEALTH IN HAWAII

WHO SHOULD ATTEND

This course will be useful for physicians and nurses who are likely to treat workers and patients having pesticide exposure, as well as industrial hygienists and other public health practitioners.

COURSE OBJECTIVES

This course provides training in recognition and treatment of illnesses and injuries caused by pesticide exposure. Participants will acquire the basic skills needed to diagnose and manage acute and chronic health effects from exposure to pesticides, and to understand and comply with Hawaii pesticide regulations.

Participants will gain knowledge of the following:

- Pesticide toxicology basics
- Hawaii reporting requirements/worker protection standards
- Acute health effects of pesticide exposure
- Pesticide emergency medicine
- Dermatitis & chronic effects of pesticide exposure
- Case studies in pesticide illness & roundtable discussion

PESTICIDE EMERGENCY RESPONSE

WHO SHOULD ATTEND

This course is designed for first responders in a pesticide emergency: firefighters, police, employees of the Department of Transportation, Department of Health, or Civil Defense, or other professionals who need training in emergency response when pesticides are present.

COURSE OBJECTIVES

Participants will learn the special risks in a pesticide emergency and will be able to evaluate the elements of a site health and safety plan to determine whether adequate precautions are being taken.

Participants will gain knowledge of the following:

- Regulation of pesticides by the state of Hawaii, EPA, FDA
- Types of pesticides used in the state of Hawaii
- Hazard recognition/CAMEO
- Personal protective equipment
- Site characterization/site safety plan
- Hawaii case studies
