OPEN BURNING

Effective January 2012, the Hawaii Administrative Rules, Subchapter 3, "Open Burning" was amended. Open burning of any material including green yard waste and household trash is prohibited throughout the state and its counties.

Violations of open burning rules may result in fines of up to \$10,000 per day for each offense.

Owners, operators or managers of property, premises, businesses or industries where open burning occurs will be held responsible.



Agricultural Burning

Open burning for agricultural purposes is restricted to legitimate agricultural businesses which have a valid burn permit from the Department of Health and are following established permit conditions.

Agricultural burning may be further restricted by government agencies in times of drought, fire hazards or "NO BURN DAYS".

WHAT CAN YOU DO:

Recycle acceptable products at your nearest community collector.

Compost your yard waste or take it to the nearest refuse convenience center.

Consider buying practices that will reduce excess product or containers.

Donate old but clean clothes, readable magazines and books and working appliances.
