Hawaii Access To Recovery (ATR) Program

Hawaii Access to Recovery Project (ATR) is administered by the State of Hawaii, Department of Health, Alcohol and Drug Abuse Division (ADAD) through a federal grant from the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA). The ATR program is a voucher-based, fee-for-service program managed through the online Web Infrastructure for Treatment Services (WITS) System and provides funding for wrap-around Recovery Support Services (RSS) such as housing, child care, cultural support, and spiritual support. The ATR Program does not pay for substance abuse treatment.

Service Populations & Eligibility

The area of implementation for ATR is the Island of Oahu. The identified populations to be served are substance abusing adults in need of treatment, those currently in treatment for substance abuse, and those discharged from substance abuse treatment within the last 2 years. This includes:

1. Child Welfare Service open, active cases (VCM, FSS included);
2. Criminal justice involved clients in the community (parole, work release, etc.);
3. Dual-diagnosis clients currently working with a mental health counselor or mental health case worker.

Eligibility alone, does **NOT** guarantee admittance into the program. Admittance into the program is determined during the intake and assessment process at the Recovery Support Services (RSS) Units.

Persons under the age of 18:

In general, the Access to Recovery (ATR) program accepts adult clients with substance abuse issues who have either been successfully discharged from treatment, are in treatment, or will be going into treatment. However, parents under the age of 18 that have open active CWS cases (including VCM and FSS cases) are eligible to interview for Access to Recovery (ATR) services. As with any client, eligibility for the ATR program does NOT guarantee admittance into the program. Admittance into the program is determined during the intake and assessment process at the Recovery Support Services (RSS) Units. Any adolescent client interested in enrollment with ATR would be considered on a case-by-case basis. All ATR services are geared toward adult populations and may not be appropriate for all adolescents.

How the Program Works:

Clients can be referred by an organization or individual, or can “walk-in” on their own, to one of the ATR Recovery Support Service (RSS) Units. ***Please see “How to refer” and “How to apply” documents for more information.***

The RSS Units will verify if the client is eligible for the ATR Program, determine if the client needs to be referred for substance abuse treatment or not, complete all necessary enrollment documentation, work with the client to identify needed Recovery Support Services and make the appropriate referrals based on the providers and services that the client chooses.

No funds are awarded directly to the client. All funds are paid directly to approve ATR contracted providers, or approved third party vendors providing services to qualified ATR clients. Approval of funds and services is contingent on availability of funds, continued eligibility of the client, client compliance to program requirements, adherence to the RSS assessment and subject to local, state and federal law.

Funds, services, and program participation may be terminated at anytime, at the discretion of ADAD ATR administration. ATR program documents, requirements, and related content is subject to change without prior notice.
